Army Futures Command Continues to Prepare

Col. Wade Johnston, USA, chief information officer (CIO) of the Army Futures Command, told a packed room at the chapter's July monthly luncheon that it has been 50 years since a four-star headquarters was stood up. The command is located in Austin, Texas, with Gen. John Murray, USA, as its first commander. The command was created to develop how future soldiers will fight with new technology to ensure rapid deliv-ery to the warfighter. Modernization was a key issue in creating this command, with a focus on strategic innovation and capabilities that will address future challenges. Army Futures Command is uniquely organized. It is currently staffed at 55 percent and looks to reach a goal of 500 employees soon. As CIO, Col. Johnston said the biggest challenge he faces today is building his staff. "I need to reach a goal of 35 folks and at the same time establish policies and procedures." By the end of this summer, Army Futures Command should reach a 70 percent staffing rate as they continue to prepare to deploy, fight and win the nation's wars.



Super Bowl-Winning Coach Tony Dungy Inspires with Leadership Talk

Coach Tony Dungy was the guest speaker for the chapter's May luncheon. Dungy is a former Tampa Bay Buc-

caneers and Super Bowl-winning coach of the Indianapolis Colts, NFL Hall of Fame member, analyst for NBC's Football Night In America and a The New York Times bestselling author. Dungy's words and example have intrigued millions of people, particularly following his victory in Super Bowl XLI, the first for an African American coach. How is it possible for a football coach to win the respect of his players and lead them to the Super Bowl minus the screaming histrionics or profanities, and without demanding that the sport come before anything else? Dungy gave an inspiring talk in which he explained the secrets to his success. Principles, practices and priorities have kept him on track despite overwhelming obstacles, including personal trials, firings and stereotypes. Dungy signed books immediately following the event. It was a great turnout and presented an opportunity for valuable networking.
